Understanding child labor laws: Anyone who grew up on a dairy farm knows the value of developing a strong work ethic at an early age. When I was younger, I remember complaining because we had to get up before school to milk the cows or because we had to milk right after we got home. Looking back now, though, having the responsibility thrust upon you at such an early age teaches you a lot about delivering on your commitments. Employers know if they are hiring someone who grew up working on the farm that, for the most part, the employee will show up on time, work until the job is completed, and not call off work for minor reasons.

Unfortunately, who you employ on your farm can be a risk to your dairy operation, if you are not following the rules properly. In addition to being a safety risk, not following the rules can also lead to unwanted fines. Investigators within the Department of Labor at both the federal and state level have the authority to assess compliance with FLSA provisions. If an employer violates the youth employment provisions, they could be subject to civil money penalties (CMP) or fines. What can sometimes happen is a workplace injury can signal a concern that leads to an assessment conducted by DOL. CMP assessments or fines are often higher if a violation contributed to an injury of a young person on the farm.

The Federal Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) has provisions in it for employing youth on and off the farm. The provisions for those working in agriculture are different than the provisions for those working in non-farm jobs. FLSA also sets different provisions for youth employees depending on their age. FLSA laws cover any employees whose work involves production of agricultural goods leaving the state directly or indirectly and becoming a part of interstate commerce. Even if you are shipping your milk to a plant within Pennsylvania, if the product

hours in jobs not declared hazardous by the Secretary of Labor. Those young people aged 12 to 13 years old may




work outside of school hours in non-hazardous jobs on farms that also employ one or more of their parents or if they have written consent from their parents. Youth under the age of 12 may work on a farm outside of school hours in non-hazardous jobs with parental consent, only if that farm is one that has no employees subject

The FLSA law does allow for youth of any age to work on the farm at any time in any job if the farm is owned and operated by their parents. So, for any young people who like me may have threatened to turn their parents into Child Labor for making them work when they'd rather been sleeping, it would have been pointless to do so.

The tricky thing about the FLSA provisions is understanding what is considered a hazardous job on the farm. Operating a tractor of over 20 PTO horsepower, or connecting and disconnecting an implement or any of its parts to or from a tractor with more than 20 PTO horsepower, would be considered a hazardous job. Operating a combine, forage harvester, baler or any similar piece of equipment is considered hazardous. Working in a pen with a cow and newborn calf or on a ladder at a height above 20 feet is also considered hazardous. Handling or applying toxic agricultural chemicals identified with the words "danger, poison" or with a skull warning on them would be hazardous, as well. Most milking equipment chemicals come with those labels. There are also many other hazardous jobs listed on the FLSA web page.
