## CDE DAIRY MARKETS & MANAGEMENT UPDATE

Crop Progress: COVID-19 has slowed or shut a lot of things down since the middle of March. One thing it has not slowed down was the weather. Except for some colder than average temperatures in late April and early May that brought light snow in parts of the state, the weather has been good for getting spring fieldwork done. During the abnormally cold stretch that saw frost several mornings, a lot of fruit trees and fruit plants were in full bloom and the extent of frost damage was harmful. One orchard and berry farm near me reported nearly their entire strawberry crop was killed by frost. It has warmed up nicely since then, and there have been plenty of dry days to go with adequate rainfall, making this spring an overall good one for planting. Pennsylvania is one of the top 18 producers of corn and top 9

As of the June 1, 2020 report, Pennsylvania has 80% of its corn planted and is on track with the 5-year average of 79%. Corn planting at this point in the year is ahead of last year, indicating better weather this year. Last spring was wet in several parts of the state, and only 72% of the corn was in the ground this time last year. A testament to how nice the weather was last week for planting is seen when compared to last week's report. The Crop Progress report dated May 26 showed that only 47% of the corn crop was planted. This was well below the 5-year average of 65% at the end of the third week in May. Pennsylvania farmers were able to get about one-third of the corn crop in the ground last week.

Pennsylvania is not as far along with its oat crop compared to the 5-year average of 97% of oats acreage planted. However, at 91% planted, it is not very far behind. Pennsylvania is not in the top 18 soybean producers so individual state statistics are not reported, but the top 18-state total of 75% of soybean acreage planted is ahead of the 68% 5-year average and well above last year's

If you remember, much of the country was extremely wet last spring, and planting was well behind schedule. Soil moisture across the state shows adequate recent rainfall with 89% of the

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cropland acreage estimated to have adequate topsoil moisture content compared to 3% short and 8% surplus. The USDA began accepting applications through local Farm Service Agency
