JUNE: Summer is here, and heat and humidity are on the rise. Cow comfort should be a priority year-round, but it's especially important when it becomes hotter and more humid. Cows do not dissipate heat very well on their own, and mastitis-causing organisms love to grow in hot, wet environments. Make sure fans and sprinkler systems are functioning properly and that bedding is clean and dry. If pastures have low, wet areas, consider temporarily fencing cattle out to allow the area to dry and prevent cattle from lying in the mud.

Current Class III and IV milk futures prices continue to improve. Class III futures as of June 24, 2019 for the next 12 months are averaging \$17.00 per hundredweight, up 37 cents compared to the same time in May. Class IV futures are averaging \$17.29, only 5 cents above this time last month, but still trading \$1.52 per hundredweight above the five-year Class IV average of \$15.77.

There is a lot of volatility in the market right now due to trade uncertainties and feed availability with late planting in much of the country. Corn and soybean futures are both currently trading at over \$1.00 per bushel more than April closing prices.

The U.S. dairy herd shrank again in May. Cow numbers were down 0.75% to 9.333 million head compared to 9.404 million in May 2018. This led to a 0.31% reduction in total milk production to 9.3 billion pounds despite an increase of 0.45% in production per cow. Dairy slaughter was up 5.30% to 258,100 head over May 2018, 13,000 head more than last year. The Pennsylvania dairy herd also declined in May versus last year. Cow numbers fell from 523,000 to 493,000 head. Milk production dropped 7.0% from last year to 887 million pounds.


tariffs, the U.S. exported over \$500 million worth of exports. The U.S. government removed aluminum and steel tariffs for North American trading partners as of July 1, 2019. Subse-


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quently, Mexico and Canada suspended their retaliatory tariffs on dairy, opening dairy trade between the U.S., Mexico and Canada to pre-tariff NAFTA trade guidelines.

The U.S. Administration is hopeful that the new United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) will be ratified by the U.S. Congress soon. Chinese and U.S. representatives are scheduled to resume trade discussions soon. Despite trade disputes within North America and China, the U.S. is making significant progress in Southeast Asia and the Middle East, especially with cheese exports.
