CDE DAIRY MARKETS & MANAGEMENT UPDATE All prices – TUESDAY, JUNE 30, 2020 – except where noted

JUNE: We will celebrate our nation's 244th anniversary on July 4, 2020. Pennsylvania is rich in Revolutionary War history, including the formal signing of the Declaration of Independence in Philadelphia on July 4, 1776. With recent events of the COVID-19 pandemic and renewed civil rights discussions, it is easy to lose sight of how far we have come as a nation in those 244 years. We are not a nation without flaws, but with compromise and openness, we will come out of these challenges a better nation. At the base of it all is U.S. agriculture. Without the advances U.S. farmers have made since our nation began, we would not be where we are now. One percent of the nation feeds the other 99% plus other families across the globe. You are the backbone of our country.

At the close of the market on Friday, June 26, 2020, average Class III for the next 12 months was continuing the trend of increased milk prices. Average Class III milk futures price was \$17.23 per cwt, \$1.21 higher than the average at the end of May 2020. Class IV milk price for the next 12 months averaged \$15.32, continuing a trend of increasing price at \$0.77 per cwt higher than this time last month. May Class III and IV prices closed at \$12.14 and \$10.07, respectively. These prices represent the lowest prices since 2009.

May U.S. milk production decreased to 18.840 billion pounds, a 1.14% drop over May 2019. This indicates that the drastic measures taken by the dairy industry to reduce milk production – in response to shifts in demand caused by COVID-19 – worked. Dairy cow slaughter was down to 233,300 head, nearly 10% compared to last May despite anticipated heavy culling to meet mandated milk production decreases. The national dairy herd increased to 9.370, a 0.40% increase from last year but a decrease of 11,000 head compared to April 2020. The reduction in milk supply was accomplished by a 1.53% reduction in per cow milk production. The average U.S. lactating cow produced 74.6 pounds per day this May compared to 75.7 pounds in May 2019.


Pennsylvania milk production was down to 865 million pounds, a 2.5% decrease compared to May 2019. Cow numbers decreased 2.0% to 483,000 head, while milk production per cow fell 0.5% to 66.4 pounds per cow per day Prices change daily. This market information is an example for educational purposes. The market data below are compiled weekly by Farmshine, via CME & USDA reports per mature cow this May. Last year the average mature cow in Pennsylvania was producing 66.7 pounds per day.

April exports surprised many analysts by outperforming year

over year value compared to April 2019. April exports were valued at \$512.5 million, an increase of 4.35% compared to last year. Increased export value is attributed to stronger than expected sales because of the extreme price drop that domestic prices experienced coupled with a devalued dollar. This made U.S. dairy prices attractive to some international customers. Dairy import values were down 12.15% to \$276.1 million compared to last April.

A couple weeks ago, Gov. Tom Wolf announced the Dairy CARES Program. This program takes federal money given to the Commonwealth to help its citizens affected by COVID-19. This program provides \$15 million to help reimburse dairy farmers for lost revenue due to dumped or displaced milk because of COVID-19. Any Pennsylvania dairy farmer that had to dump milk or was assessed a COVID-19 deduction by their milk marketer is eligible to receive reimbursement through this program.
